Twenty One Years and Counting

Introduction

Fink and Pardini have been forced to protect their property in court from greedy land trusts for over 21 years. The history of harassment goes back even further. The prior land



Wilber "Smitty" Smith, owner, was threatened by the same people who were determined to get his land no matter what. By 1977 Mohonk and their associates/ friends (Smitty's closest neighbor and head Mohonk Ranger Robert Larson) forced Smitty in to bankruptcy by creating roadblocks at the Town Planning Board level. This prevented Smitty from expanding his business and to make ends meet. Smitty sold 21 acres of his land to CNYE Realty Corporation. Mohonk sued Smitty and CNYE

claiming Smitty never owned the land he sold. This ended up in the first lawsuit concerning Smitty's Dude Ranch. See <u>George R. Cooley v CNYE Realty Corporation, Inc.</u> Mohonk tried to sue Fink and Pardini with the same index number from the original case in 1977. Mohonk lost on appeal. Currently the land is surrounded on all sides by the Mohonk Preserve and the landowners are considered "in-holders."

Potential Business Opportunities

The former Clove Valley Dude Ranch and the latter Smitty's Dude Ranch was a place people came from far and near. With a Smitty's Bar and Inn, live music every Saturday, horseback rides, two swimming holes with waterfalls, hiking and being free, the property is without question some of the most beautiful 300 ares in the Shawangunk Mountains. It's location alone is prime land for conservation easements and the fact that it is privately owned scares some people. It is also traditionally zoned as an agricultural/commercial property.

Since the early 1970's there is evidence showing the Mohonk Preserve's interest in the property. Not long after hostile threats of taking the property began.

Cabral, Finger, and Robert Anderberg

In the 1990's the Cabral family who had owned 200 acres on the ridge since the 1950's got involved in a law suit over the historical access to their land. There had never been a problem until Robert Anderberg had moved into the area and suggested to Gloria Finger that the Cabral's access should be closed off to protect the Cabral's property, by preventing any development. Cabral's historic access road crossed over a portion of Fingers 300 acres. So a law suit ensued. The Cabral's did not prevail. Mohonk preserve was able to pick up the Cabral land for less the \$ 1000 an acre. But now Gloria Finger owed money to the lawyers for her five years of litigation.

Anderberg suggested to Finger that she could sell some of her land to Mohonk to pay off her bill. Van Valkenberg was hired by Mohonk to survey the land that Finger would sell. The 70 acres that was sold by Finger to Mohonk was entirely owned by Karen and I. Finger did not sell a single acre that she owned. The line chosen to separate out what she would sell is the exact line that separates her land from our land. What a coincidence.

Robert Anderberg always has said "I'll get that land by hook or by crook." The Finger 70 acre land deal to Mohonk was brokered by Robert Anderberg. He was the notary, the mail back for the deed and the witness on the deed.

At the same time that Robert Anderberg and Norm Van Valkenberg where buying our 70+ acres from Gloria Finger (land that is located in a old tract called Lot 1 of the Nineteen Partners Tract) They where also buying our land from other people and making up claims for our adjacent lands on the ridge in lots 2, 3, and 4. They made a grab for all of our land on the ridge. We have been in one law suit or another ever since the first one was filled In 1995.

Mike and Karen always dreamed of re-opening the Inn and building a small house on the mountain away from Clove Valley Road and the Inn. Meetings with the neighbors resulted in threats and promises that they "*will not build one single house on the ridge.*" Since then they have been in court non-stop.

Following is testimony from trial. (Note: For unknown reasons the first line of each page was not copying into this Document). First is Anita Gherke.

14	A. Oh, I will probably remember it until I die or I'm senile		
15	because I was walking down Clove Valley Road, I may have been		
16	running, I don't remember. I was stopped by Smitty going by in

18	about, he parked on a hill and got out of the car and his pants		
19	weren't all the way on. He was pulling his pants up and very		
20	eager to come talking to me telling me his property was for		
21	sale, did I know anyone who might be interested.		
22	Q. What did you say?		
23	A. I said, actually I think I do.		
24	Q. Who did you have in mind?		
25	A. Bob Vanderberg.		

2	A. Someone I knew to be on the board of Mohonk who had
3	solicited my help in obtaining easements and rights of first
4	refusal for Mohonk and someone who told me he basically coveted
5	that piece of property.
6	Q. Did you ask Smitty at that time what was he selling?
7	A. Yes.
8	Q. What did he tell you?
9	A. He said my entire property, three hundred acres going from,
10	and again gave me the same description he had initially.
11	Q. Did that include the portion that's in dispute in this
12	case?
13	A. Absolutely.
14	Q. What did you do in response to Smitty's information he was
15	selling the ranch?
16	A. I phoned Bob Vanderberg. Guess what I just heard. And he
17	was very, very interested in owning it and said he had heard
18	that Smitty hated him and anything to do with Mohonk and would I
19	buy it and then turn it over to him.
20	Q. What did you say?
21	A. I said I will think about it. He also offered me a
22	finder's fee and it was very exciting to me the idea that I
23	might have enough money to purchase the log kit that I wanted to
24	buy. And I couldn't do it and did not and called him and told
25	him I could not do it.

2	A. It was deceitful. It was just wrong and I liked Smitty		
3	and, you know, you don't do that. Not to mention I don't think		
4	I ever saw Smitty without his shotgun. It was just wrong.		
5	Q. What did you do?		
6	A. I told my brother about the property and my brother and		
7	Karen approached Smitty.		
8	Q. Now going back to, did you ever relay to Mr. Vanderberg		
9	that you weren't willing to act as an entrepreneur?		
10	A. Absolutely. Didn't go over very well. He said I was not		
11	doing it because I was getting a better deal with my brother.		
12	And I was not doing it to get a better deal with my brother. He		
13	was concerned I did because I eventually built my log cabin		
14	which came from my aunt's money, not my brother's. He told me		
15	to pass along to my brother a threat.

22	Vanderberg and some other people, they wanted to discuss with us

24	Q. Did Mrs. Finger tell you where her land was?		
25	A. She told us that she owned land that was next to ours on

	3	the ranch lands to go to?
	4	A. Yes.
	5	Q. Did she tell you where her house was over there?
	6	A. Yes, she said it was on the other side of the mountain on
	7	the Lawrence Hill side.
	8	Q. What did Mrs. Finger say to you with regard to your plans
	9	for the land?
	10	A. We didn't really have a lot of plans for the land except
	11	that we wanted to make sure that the land was taken care of,
	12	cleaned up and that eventually we wanted to build a house on the
)	13	top of the mountain on the northwest side on the mountain side
	14	and other than that it was our intention to keep the land
	15	pristine and improve it.
	16	Q. You mentioned that you and Mike wanted to build a house or
	17	the mountain side of the property?
	18	A. Yes.
	19	Q. At that time did you make that indication to Mrs. Finger?
	20	A. Yes.
	21	Q. Did you have a spot picked out where you wanted to put you
	22	house?
	23	A. We didn't know exactly where we wanted to put it but we had
	24	told the group that we were with, there were some neighbors she
	25	had invited, that because we wanted to be neighborly we would
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putting a house and see what they thought about our position because we didn't want to offend anybody or put anybody in a position where we would be seen and we would see them. We wanted to show them we were being conscious about a large piece of land and where we would situate our home if we were to build it up top which was our plan and is still our plan hopefully someday in the future.

Q. Were you worried that maybe where you wanted to put the house was not on your land, it was on someone else's land? Why would you check with the neighbors?

A. Only because we wanted to be neighborly. And I recognize that everybody was so concerned about Smitty's because I don't know why but everybody was concerned about Smitty's. Also it's an incredibly beautiful piece of land when you are on top and you overlook the Catskill Mountains but if you were to go too close to the cliff edge everybody down below would see you. To prove to people we were being conscious about where we would place our home we told them we would show them once we had picked a spot, we would show them where we were putting it to see we were not trying to impact on anybody's view or the beauty of what people looked up at when they looked up at the cliffs.

18	on my property? He said, oh, I just put some flags there in
19	reference to the Finger property. I just was putting them there
20	for reference point. I said, really? I find that really,
21	really strange and I want you to take them down immediately. He
22	apologized. He said, okay, I will. I am sorry. And we didn't
23	wait for that. We were like, this is not happening. We went up
24	there and took the flags down. That was it, done, finished.
